



2023: BCPS

Over 73,000 students, 66% of all students, qualify for Free or Reduced School Meals (<u>FARMS</u>)

>70,000 of these students
live in families qualifying for
SNAP: annual income for
family of four cannot
exceed \$39,000

Equity Metrics Report, BCPS, 2021-2022 Poverty's effects on academic performance

Elementary Schools: Children qualifying for FARMS performed 25% below their peers in reading and 27% below their peers in math

Middle Schools: Chronic absenteeism rates for students eligible for FARMS is nearly 22% higher than for non-FARMS eligible students

Over \$7.2 million in food and essential items distributed July 2022 - June 2023:

SSN distributed <u>over \$500,000</u> in food and supplies to students and families in great need

July 2023 – December 2023:

SSN distributed over \$325,000 in food and supplies

Over half (54%) of all students in Maryland public schools, more than 485,000 students, qualify for FARMS

Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey / Youth Tobacco Survey (YRBS/YTS)

- Survey of public middle and high school students in the US
- 58,000 students in Maryland took the survey in 2021-2022
- Measures substance use (tobacco use, secondhand smoke, alcohol use, other drug use), sexual behavior, violence, bullying, diet, physical activity, gambling, mental health, adverse childhood experiences, unstable housing, etc.


In 2018, Maryland was the first state to measure food insecurity on the YRBS/YTS


Students experience <u>food insecurity</u> when their family has limited or uncertain access to adequate food

"During the past 12 months...


How often was your family worried that your food would run out before you had money to buy more?

How often did the food your family bought not last, and you did not have money to get more?"






High School Student Food Security Status, by Race and Ethnicity




High School Student Mental Health Risk Behaviors, by Food Security Status


Lowers food insecurity rates for students and families

In the 2022-2023 school year, **351** schools in Maryland enrolled in CEP

** Baltimore County joined CEP district-wide in 2023-2024 **



Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)



- Helps low-income households buy food
- Reduces food insecurity by 30%
- Reduces child poverty by 28%
- Increases high school graduation rates by 18%
- Lower rates of obesity, heart disease, and stunted growth

Maryland's Summer SNAP for Children

- A state and county funded SNAP supplement for low-income children under age 19 enrolled in SNAP
- Helps families access food during school breaks
- \$100 per child is automatically added to existing SNAP EBT card
- Towson University economists found that increasing funds for this program will "greatly benefit" the economy by creating additional jobs and increasing tax revenues, all while reducing food insecurity for children in low-income families
